In the sixteenth century this became the theme verse of the Lutheran reformation. The Latin letters VDMA (*Verbum Domini Manet in Aeternum*, “The Word of the LORD endures forever”) were even sewn onto the Lutheran soldiers’ uniforms as they faced the large Catholic armies that invaded Lutheran lands seeking to stop the Reformation and the rediscovery of the Gospel. While many of us still prefer a hard copy; mailing the *Newsletter* is no longer as feasible, but will surely be sent by regular mail if requested. Oh, and do refer

back to the Autumn 2016 issue for ten pages of features. . .and then pick up on this “Reformation 500th Anniversary” edition!

Our “Reflections” in October 2016, for example, described Julie and my service with the Wittenberg English Ministry during the last two weeks of October 2015. It concluded with the statement that is now a realization: “We are excited for the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation in 2017!” One highlight in this month is a **CU Public Lecture by Dr. Christian Kopff, “Was Martin Luther a Founding Father?”** Dr. Kopff is Associate Professor of Classics at CU and a member of ULC. His presentation, sponsored by our ULC Campus Ministry, was on October 19 in the Benson Earth Sciences

building. The Anniversary events enrich this fall season greatly!

Personal, family, and community events touch all of our ULC alumni and friends. The electronic media enables a quick sharing of these features, as we experienced in the response of **Erik Naess** (MBA ’89) of Oslo, Norway, to the invitation for the “ULC Alumni and Friends Picnic” on August 19. Erik explained: “Unfortunately a trip to the U.S. is not actual for **Kari** and me this summer.” But he went on to tell that daughter **Elise** arrived as an exchange student at “her host family outside of Portland, ME” in mid-August. Erik and Kari’s college-age daughter will spend a year of study-abroad in the U.S., but this first year of college is at a Christian “folkehøgskole” in

The 500th Anniversary of the Reformation and focus on Martin Luther (about whom we enjoy saying, “Martin Luther was a campus pastor!”) has reached its peak, and we are glad for everything good that has accompanied this commemoration! As one Lutheran leader has written, “For the past year it has been ‘All Reformation All the Time.’ Everything Martin Luther.”

Our family 2016 Christmas letter, for example, highlighted Martin Luther’s Seal, or “Rose.” We even drew upon Luther’s interpretation of the seal: “The first shall be a black cross in a heart. . . Such a heart shall stand in the middle of a **white rose**, to show that faith gives **joy, comfort, and peace**.” The rose - an enduring image!

The overarching point is made that “Liberation in Christ through faith was the freedom that transformed Luther. This freedom is what he wrote about most frequently and most passionately.” And the article in *Living Lutheran* (October 2017) concludes: “On Reformation Sunday we will hear Jesus’ promise: ‘You will know the truth, and the truth will make you free’ (John 8:32). On Oct. 31 and beyond let us live in that freedom.”

We’ll begin pointing towards another anniversary, the 60th of University Lutheran Assembly in April/May 2018. That will also mark the 35th Anniversary of our UL Foundation. We may just have the theme that connects the anniversaries!

## New lawn and sprinkler system at ULC!

Students, Foundation members, and volunteers were successfully able to install a much needed new sprinkler system and lawn at ULC in the fall. The new system is automated and controls zones that water newly laid sod in the backyard and the entire south lawn along Colorado Ave.

Much of the pre-planning was done by AJ Kade and Jeff Diehl, and with the help of all of the volunteers we were able to get everything done over two work days in the spring.

The first work day consisted of installing the new system with the use of a trench digger. The second work day was a much more intense day with several volunteers helping through the coordination of Thrivent. We were able to spread out 20 CYs of compost and lay down approximately 3,000 SF of sod. We were also able to get some of the landscape rock started along Colorado Ave. This was later completed by the students on a separate work day.

Thanks to all of those who donated to this project and were able to volunteer. The remaining funds will be used for tree removal in the front area.
