Be always our defender When dangers gather round; When all the earth is crumbling, Safe may Your Church be found. Needless to say, that was our

of this, all the snow that come over the months of October, November, December, and January also ended up finding its resting spot in our Sanctuary and Hall (thankfully, much of it in buckets that filled our space for those months) which brought more significant damage.

This did present a number of challenges to our year; but it also brought a lot of joy. Our students, who make up a vast majority of our members/ attendees, took up the cause of making things work for meals, Bible Studies and other events. They came together to work on plans to renovate the chapel along with help from the Rocky Mountain District Office and area congregations. Because of the great support that we received, we do not have to simply put a "bandaid" on the damage, but are able to address the other problems with a building celebrating 50 years of service to our students.

Now, after much prayer and thanksgiving, our Chapel and Fellowship Hall are finally in the process of being renovated. As I write this article, the Asbestos Abatement crew is completing the work of removing the tile from the Sanctuary and soon the renovations will be able to begin. This will include moving the "Mundinger Library" from its current space to where the Pastor's Study was located in the House Section of our Student Center. Our students are excited to be able to use this space in new ways for Bible Studies, groups study sessions, etc. A new "gathering" area will be located where the Mundinger Library used to reside. This open space area (the wall had to be torn down due to mold) will serve as a place for students to gather before the service on Sunday nights and throughout the week. We also will be renovating the kitchen and bathrooms, along with new flooring, lights, and ceiling in both the Fellowship Hall and Chapel. Please keep us in your prayers as this process continues and we start the new school year "under construction."

The Alumni Foundation Board also wants to play a part in this renovation. At our recent meeting, the Board resolved to raise funds towards two specific areas. The first is to add greater security to the building. We want our students to be able to access the building whenever they need to, while also being safe when they are here. We hope to raise funds towards installing a "fob" security system so that we can give each student an "access key" that would allow them into the building to study, join in fellowship, etc, as well as funds towards a video security system. In recent years the Chapel has been broken into a number of times and we feel the added security will make our students more comfortable as well as encourage the use of this space.

The second area is that of technology. We want our students to be able to use this space for group study sessions with their classmates at CU as well as for Movie Nights and other times of fellowship and Bible Study. Money raised towards this will go to rewiring the space to include USB ports, better wireless internet access, and projectors in the Fellowship Hall and House Section of our building. 

We expand our vision from that celebration. At that same time, a story of our alumni was unfolding about which I wrote in November, an "International Intersection Out of Campus Ministry." Here is an edited version:

A cluster of friends from the campus ministry of University Lutheran Chapel in Boulder, Colorado (Daniel Burhop, Campus Pastor), had come together in Pretoria, South Africa, at a previous time. In fact, a phone message was left for former campus pastor, Bob Stuenkel, and his wife Julie several years ago when **Amy Schirmer** (CU '87) was visiting with **Kurt** (CU '86) and **Cindy** (M.D. '90) **Firnhaber** at their family home in Pretoria, and they were joined by **Arden** (M.S. '88) and **Susan Strasser** from Zambia. They have remained closely connected in their several international settings.

Their intersection in this past November, however, took on an even more remarkable character, and the story needs to be told. We learned in mid-November that Cindy was about to undergo surgery for cancer in Johannesburg, and we sent an e-mail expressing our prayer support for her healing. In Kurt's messages about Cindy's good recovery, he mentioned that Amy Schirmer had visited from Iraq in the weeks leading up to the surgery and had taken over much of the cooking for the Firnhaber household, even preparing meals that could be frozen and drawn upon in the period of Cindy's treatments. Above all, Amy was available to Cindy and Kurt with loving encouragement.

Kurt also told about Arden Strasser accompanying his father from Zambia for medical treatment in Johannesburg and was available for visits at the hospital the day after Cindy's surgery and for prayer with them. This happened to coincide--but then again, the Strassers and the Firnhabers have been there for each other since they spent six months together in the 1980s serving as volunteers in mission in Zimbabwe.

The friendships and shared visions actually developed in campus ministry together. The journeys of these friends--their educational and career accomplishments, their dedicated commitment to serving in various international settings--can only be described in book-length form. Cindy, for example, is a physician and research scientist in HIV/AIDS (women's health) and is a member of an international committee. Amy and her husband, **Ian**, have settled in Gainesville, Florida, but Amy continues to train teachers of ESL in various countries. (We told about Amy being evacuated from Cairo, Egypt, while attending a U. S. State Department conference as the "Arab Spring" was erupting several years ago.) Kurt, Arden, and Susan have amazing careers in health care and in ministry.

We thank God that they came together at just the right time for Cindy's support; it just worked out that way! There is one more facet to this intersection. Even before Kurt and Arden had served as president of University Lutheran Congregation while students at the University of Colorado--and Amy, as Peer Minister with international students, **Ron Jetter** was a trustee of our Lutheran Campus Ministry facilities as an engineering student and was president in his

senior year, when he decided to continue graduate study for Lutheran ministry.

Each of the campus ministry members mentioned above have distinctive histories in connection with the development of the place and its facilities—another series of important stories. The international intersection during the past November in South Africa, however, is an outgrowth of campus ministry that brings forth the epitome of thanksgiving. And there are signs that the story will go on..."

That is the case, and those updates are part of the "News from Alumni and Friends..." section of this newsletter.

One more "surprising" story. In late October, a phone call came from **Charles Kanefke**, who wondered if I remembered his one academic year with us at the Chapel, 1981-82. His home was in New Jersey, and he had entered CU to study electrical engineering. The memories of "Chuck" came back as he described his participation with us and the decisions he was making to return to his home area for the remainder of his Double-E program. His engineering career, particularly in computer operations for the banking industry in New Jersey and New York, continued for twenty years.

Charles was now calling, however, from his ministry in Cape Coral, Florida. He entered Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, IN, more than a decade ago and has served as pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Cape Coral for six years.
